: **St. Camillus**. Born in 1550 in Italy. He dedicated himself with a group of others to the service of the sick, prisoners, and especially of plague victims.

: **Shrine to Our Lady of Guadalupe**: In 1531, a "Lady from Heaven" appeared to a poor Indian, Juan Diego at Tepeyac, Mexico. Her message is love and compassion.

Art & Commentary by John August Swanson

: **A Celebration**—All my life I have loved gatherings of people where there was a spirit of celebration and dancing. The music and movements, the colors and costumes, captivated me.

: **Good Samaritan**—When viewing this painting, the scenes can be studied as a group sequence, or looked at and thought about individually.

: **Washing of the Feet**—The theme of this picture encourages us to show love for all and true humility of spirit. I feel this paschal season ritual transcends particular religious observances and gives us a beautiful guide for our lives.

: **Psalm 85**—When the verses from Psalm 85 are read in liturgical services, I would visualize the poetry in the words, the hope they made me feel about living.

: **Nativity, Epiphany, & Flight into Egypt**—In creating this work, I was inspired by the beautiful stained glass windows in the cathedral at Chartres. These images were also inspired by the Mexican Christmas traditions where families each create a beautiful crèche (nacimiento).

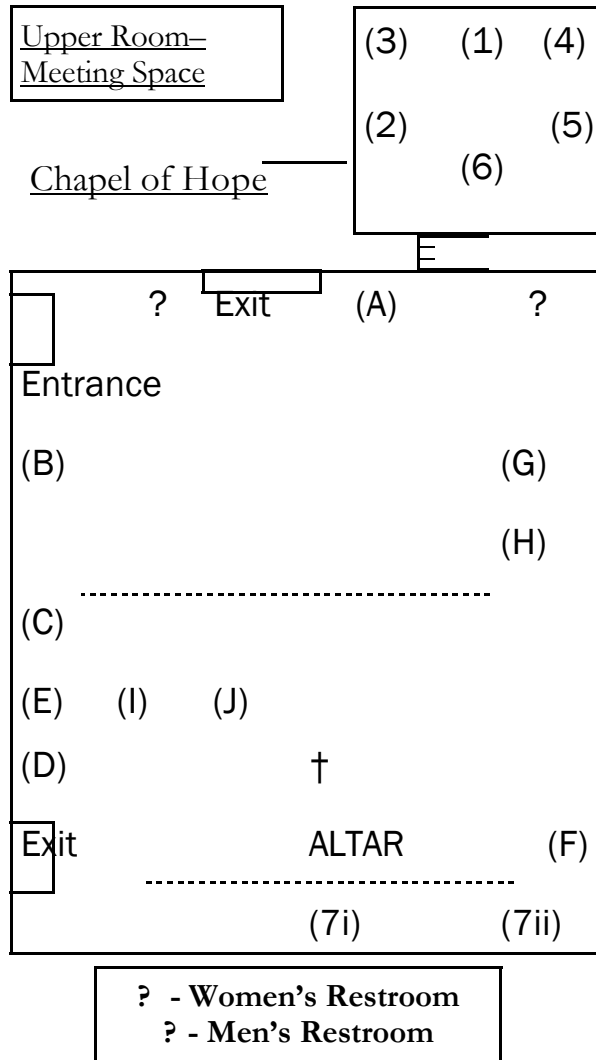
: **A Visit**—Usually Mary is represented in paintings by herself, so I showed her as part of a community. I have tried to show that all the people are doing their everyday work that has no grandeur or representation of power over others.

: **Stations of the Cross Wood Carvings**: traditional reflection on the Passion of Jesus Christ

: **Oils of Healing (Hanging)**: Oils blessed at Cathedral for Anointing of the Sick and Baptism.

: **Peace Pole**: This Peace Pole is a hand-crafted monument that displays the message and prayer *May Peace Prevail on Earth* on each of its four sides, in 8 different languages. There are more than 200,000 Peace Poles in 180 countries all over the world dedicated as monuments to peace.

### History of St. Camillus Center for Pastoral Care

The Catholic Archdiocese of Los Angeles has provided a religious presence to the Los Angeles County hospital since 1876 with the Daughters of Charity and the clergy from Sacred Heart parish. St. Camillus was founded in 1954 as a parish which also attended to the General Hospital. In 1985 it became St. Camillus Center for Pastoral Care after the hospital became LAC+USC Medical Center/Health Care Network and with the building of Norris Cancer and USC University hospitals. We provide 24 hour ministry to these populations.
